## **The South of Ireland Self Drive Tour**

### **DETAILED ITINERARY**

#### **Day 1: Dublin**

Welcome to Ireland's vibrant capital city—Dublin! Upon arrival at the airport, you have the flexibility to collect your rental car today or wait until tomorrow before setting off on your first driving day. If you prefer a relaxed start without navigating city traffic, we recommend transferring directly to your centrally located accommodation and collecting your car the following morning.

After checking in, take some time to explore this historic and endlessly fascinating city. Wander Dublin at your own pace—strolling Georgian squares, crossing the River Liffey, or browsing lively neighbourhoods such as Grafton Street and Temple Bar. If you'd like a deeper introduction, you can join a privately guided walking tour to uncover the city's most iconic landmarks and colourful stories.

No visit to Dublin is complete without experiencing St. James's Gate and the world-famous Guinness Storehouse, where you can learn the story of Ireland's most iconic stout before enjoying a pint with sweeping panoramic views from the Gravity Bar.

Settle in and enjoy your first evening in Ireland, soaking up the culture, hospitality, and charm that make Dublin such a captivating beginning to your self-drive adventure.

## Day 2: Dublin to Laragh with Glendalough Hike

This morning, begin your journey south from Dublin and enjoy a beautifully scenic drive into the heart of the Wicklow Mountains. Leaving the energy of the capital behind, the route quickly transforms into rolling countryside, quiet forests, and heather-clad hills as you approach the peaceful village of Laragh, your base for the night. This gateway to Glendalough is perfectly positioned for exploring some of Ireland's most celebrated natural and historic landscapes.

Once in Laragh, leave your vehicle behind and step straight into the tranquillity of the Wicklow Way, Ireland's oldest and best-known long-distance walking trail. From here, well-marked forest paths guide you gently into the glacial valley of Glendalough, one of the country's most treasured heritage sites. Founded by St. Kevin in the 6th century, Glendalough is famed for its early medieval monastic settlement, serene lakes, and dramatic mountain backdrop.

Depending on your energy and interest, there are multiple trail options to choose from. Adventurous hikers may wish to take on the more challenging upper-level loop, climbing toward one of the stunning viewpoints overlooking the Upper Lake. The reward is a sweeping panorama of deep forests, still waters, and steep valley walls—one of the most iconic vistas in Ireland.

For a more relaxed afternoon, follow one of the gentler lakeshore or woodland trails. These peaceful walks bring you past ancient ruins, through stands of native woodland, and along boardwalks that reveal the delicate flora and vibrant birdlife of the area.

After exploring this legendary valley at your own pace, return to the village of Laragh—perfect for an evening of calm, warm hospitality and anticipation of the adventures still to come.

## Day 3: Laragh to Cork

After breakfast, you continue your journey south from Laragh, travelling at your own pace along a route rich in history, culture, and scenic beauty. Today is designed to be flexible, allowing you to explore the places that inspire you most as you make your way toward Cork.

Your first major highlight is the magnificent Rock of Cashel, one of Ireland's most celebrated heritage sites. Rising dramatically from the Tipperary landscape, this ancient limestone outcrop is crowned with medieval towers, a soaring cathedral, and the beautifully preserved Cormac's Chapel with its remarkable stone carvings. Take your time exploring the ruins, enjoying both the sweeping views across the Golden Vale and the extraordinary history embedded in every wall.

From Cashel, you may choose one or more of several optional detours—each offering its own charm:

### Cahir Castle

One of Ireland's best-preserved castles, set on a rocky island in the River Suir. Its towering walls and atmospheric halls offer a vivid look into medieval life.

### Kilkenny City

A vibrant medieval town known for its winding streets, artisan shops, and the elegant Kilkenny Castle. Ideal for lunch, a stroll, or a deep dive into Irish craftsmanship.

### Blarney Castle

Explore beautiful gardens, woodland walks, and the famous Blarney Stone—said to bestow the “gift of eloquence” upon all who kiss it.

After a day rich in discovery, continue to Cork, Ireland's culinary capital. Check into your hotel before you head into the city to enjoy Cork's vibrant dining scene at your leisure.

## Day 4: Cork to Glengarriff with Sheep's Head Hike

After breakfast, begin your day on one of the world's most celebrated coastal touring routes—the Wild Atlantic Way. This legendary stretch of road winds along Ireland's southwest coastline, revealing rugged cliffs, rolling seascapes, colourful villages, and countless viewpoints that invite you to pause, breathe, and take it all in. Today marks the first of four magnificent peninsulas you'll explore over the coming days.

Your journey will bring you through colourful towns and villages and showcases rugged coastlines & rolling green landscapes—perfect for those who want to enjoy a full day immersed in coastal scenery before arriving in Glengarriff for the evening.

Your featured hike brings you to the wonderfully remote Sheep's Head Peninsula, a thin finger of land stretching into the Atlantic between Bantry Bay and Dunmanus Bay. Renowned for its tranquillity and unspoilt beauty, Sheep's Head is a walker's paradise—quiet, wild, and breathtaking from every angle.

The Sheep's Head Lighthouse Loop is an exhilarating 4.2 km ( $\approx$  2.6 miles) walk that carries you right to the very tip of the peninsula. The cliff-top trail undulates along rugged terrain, offering uninterrupted views across the bays, the distant mountains of the Beara and Mizen peninsulas, and the endless Atlantic horizon. The lighthouse itself stands proudly against the elements, a solitary sentinel overlooking the meeting point of land and sea. This short but unforgettable loop walk is the perfect introduction to the raw beauty of West Cork.

After finishing your hike, continue your scenic drive east along coastal roads, passing through traditional farming communities, small harbours, and pockets of ancient oak woodland as you make your way toward the village of Glengarriff. Nestled at the head of Bantry Bay and surrounded by steep, forested hillsides, Glengarriff is a warm and inviting place to unwind after a day of adventure.

## Day 5: Glengarriff to Kenmare & Gleninchaquin Hike

Today's journey takes you deeper into the untamed beauty of the Beara Peninsula, one of Ireland's most spectacular coastal regions. Begin your morning with a stunning drive along quiet, winding roads that hug the shoreline, revealing sweeping views of rugged headlands, glittering bays, and the distant peaks of the Caha Mountains. The Beara Peninsula is dotted with remote villages, ancient monuments, and islands steeped in folklore—making it a joy to explore at your own pace.

If the sea calls, you may choose to visit one of Beara's offshore gems. Bere Island is only a short ferry ride from Castletownbere and offers peaceful walking trails, historic military sites, and panoramic coastal vistas. Or venture west to the tip of the peninsula, where Dursey Island is accessed via Ireland's only cable car—an unforgettable experience that glides you over wild Atlantic waters to a windswept, tranquil landscape untouched by time.

For those remaining on the mainland, your hiking highlight today is a visit to the extraordinary Uragh Stone Circle, an atmospheric Bronze Age monument set against a breathtaking backdrop of lakes and mountains. From here, follow a quiet country road into the enchanting Gleninchaquinn Park, a working sheep farm and one of Ireland's most beautiful natural enclaves. Your walk leads through open fields dotted with sheep before climbing gradually to the upper slopes of the valley.

At the heart of the park lies its spectacular waterfall—cascading down a rocky cliffside and offering magnificent views from the top. From this vantage point, you can take in sweeping panoramas across shimmering lakes, lush green fields, and the vast expanse of Kenmare Bay beyond.

After completing your hike, continue your journey to the vibrant heritage town of Kenmare, often called the "Gateway to the Ring of Kerry," where you will settle in for the night.

## Day 6: Kenmare to Dingle via the Ring of Kerry

Today you set out to explore one of Ireland’s most spectacular and world-famous touring routes—the Ring of Kerry, a region celebrated for its dramatic landscapes and coastal grandeur. Leaving Kenmare, the road carries you west along sweeping bays and rugged peninsulas, where the Atlantic Ocean meets rolling green hills, golden beaches, and some of the most iconic scenery on the Wild Atlantic Way.

As you journey through the Iveragh Peninsula, you’ll pass through postcard-perfect villages such as Sneem, Caherdaniel, and Waterville, each offering beautiful viewpoints, artisan cafés, and opportunities for short scenic stops. The constantly changing vista—towering mountains one moment, endless ocean the next—captures the soul of rural Ireland at its most striking.

For those wishing to stretch their legs, an excellent walking option today is the Derrynane Mass Path Loop Walk, a rewarding 6-mile (≈9 km) route through the hillside woodlands of Derrynane National Park. This moderate hike takes around 3.5 hours and offers sweeping views over Derrynane’s Blue Flag Beach, the sheltered harbour, and the historic grounds of Derrynane House, the ancestral home of Daniel O’Connell, “The Liberator.” It’s a wonderfully immersive way to experience the Ring of Kerry on foot.

After completing the loop or continuing your scenic drive, follow the coast north toward the Dingle Peninsula. The landscape gradually shifts as you enter County Kerry’s westernmost region—an area known for its rugged cliffs, ancient archaeology, and strong Gaelic culture.

Your day concludes in the colourful fishing town of Dingle, renowned for its lively music scene, artisan shops, and excellent seafood. Settle into your accommodation for a well-earned rest as you prepare for more extraordinary coastal landscapes tomorrow.

## Day 7: Slea Head Hike

This morning, a short transfer brings you from Dingle town to just beyond the beautiful curve of Ventry Harbour, where today's unforgettable coastal walk begins. From here, you follow one of the most scenic and historically rich stretches of the Dingle Peninsula—an 8.5 km route around the world-famous Slea Head, the westernmost point in Ireland and one of the most photographed locations on the Wild Atlantic Way.

Your hike carries you along quiet cliff-top trails with panoramic views across the Atlantic Ocean. Along the route, you will have the opportunity to see the remarkable beehive huts (clocháns), ancient dry-stone dwellings dating back hundreds of years. These perfectly preserved structures offer a fascinating glimpse into early Gaelic settlement and the long history of life on the peninsula.

As you continue west, the views open dramatically toward the Blasket Islands, a remote and rugged archipelago famed for its wildlife, literary heritage, and haunting beauty. On a clear day, the islands appear almost within touching distance—an inspiring sight as you near the end of your hike.

Your walk finishes in the tiny village of Dunquin, the most westerly settlement in Ireland and home to the iconic pier that descends in a zig-zag path toward the sea. Here, you have two wonderful options: visit the Blasket Centre, an award-winning interpretive museum telling the story of island life, or—weather permitting—take a boat trip across to the Great Blasket Island for an unforgettable encounter with its history, scenery, and resident seals.

At a pre-arranged time, we will collect you from Dunquin and return you to Dingle, where you can enjoy another relaxing evening in this lively fishing town.

## Day 8: Dingle to Doolin

After breakfast, it's time to leave the Kingdom of Kerry behind and begin your journey north toward the colourful village of Doolin, gateway to the Cliffs of Moher and the Burren. Today offers two equally memorable route options, allowing you to tailor the day to your preferred pace and interests.

### Option 1: Coastal Route via Ferry

Travel northeast from Dingle to Tarbert, where you can board the short Shannon Ferry crossing to Kilimer—a relaxing and scenic way to enter County Clare. From here, follow the spectacular Loop Head coastline, stopping in charming seaside towns such as Kilkee, Doonbeg, and Lahinch. Each offers opportunities for coastal walks, fresh seafood, and panoramic Atlantic viewpoints.

Continue onward to the Cliffs of Moher, one of Ireland's most iconic natural wonders. These soaring cliffs rise dramatically above the Atlantic Ocean and are best appreciated on foot along the coastal paths. You may also choose to take a boat cruise from the base of the cliffs for a completely different—and unforgettable—perspective. Arrive in the lively village of Doolin, famous for its traditional music, warm hospitality, and proximity to the Burren.

### Option 2: Inland Route via Limerick & Bunratty

Travel east from Dingle toward Limerick, a vibrant riverside city with medieval landmarks, excellent cafés, and museums. You may wish to stop and explore King John's Castle, stroll along the Shannon riverside, or enjoy lunch in the city centre.

From Limerick, continue north with the option to visit Bunratty Castle & Folk Park, one of Ireland's best-preserved medieval fortresses and heritage villages. Further along, you may also take a scenic detour into the Burren National Park, with its unique limestone landscapes, rare flora, and quiet walking trails. Finish your day at the Cliffs of Moher (time permitting) before arriving at your accommodation in Doolin, ready to enjoy its lively pubs and traditional Irish music.

## Day 9: Doolin to Galway via the Burren

Today you leave the coastal village of Doolin behind and travel north toward Galway, the bohemian and cultural capital of Ireland's west. As you make your way along the coast, you will journey through one of Ireland's most extraordinary landscapes—the Burren, a region famed for its lunar-like limestone pavements, rare flora, ancient tombs, and sweeping Atlantic views.

You have two excellent ways to spend your day:

### Option 1 – Direct to Galway City

Drive straight to Galway and enjoy the rest of the day discovering this vibrant and colourful harbour city. Wander through its lively streets filled with musicians, artisan shops, and historic landmarks such as the Spanish Arch and St Nicholas' Collegiate Church. Galway's renowned culinary scene offers everything from casual seafood bars to award-winning restaurants, making it the perfect place to relax, explore, and soak in Ireland's famously warm atmosphere.

### Option 2 – Explore Burren National Park

For a day rich in nature and scenery, travel into Burren National Park and choose from several rewarding loop walks:

Abbey Hill Loop (6.2 km / 3.8 miles): A shorter hike with beautiful views over Galway Bay.

Carron Loop (9.1 km / 5.6 miles): A moderate circuit through limestone terraces and wildflower-strewn valleys.

Green Road Loop (18 km / 11.2 miles): A longer, dramatic walk through classic Burren terrain—ideal for avid walkers.

Each route offers a different perspective on this remarkable landscape, where wild orchids grow between cracked limestone, ancient ringforts sit on wind-scoured hillsides, and the vast Atlantic opens out beyond rugged cliffs.

Continue north to Galway, arriving in the late afternoon or early evening to settle in and enjoy your night in one of Ireland's most spirited and welcoming cities.

If you have an early flight we recommend adding an extra day to overnight in Dublin before your flight or travelling to Dublin following your time in Galway on Day 7.

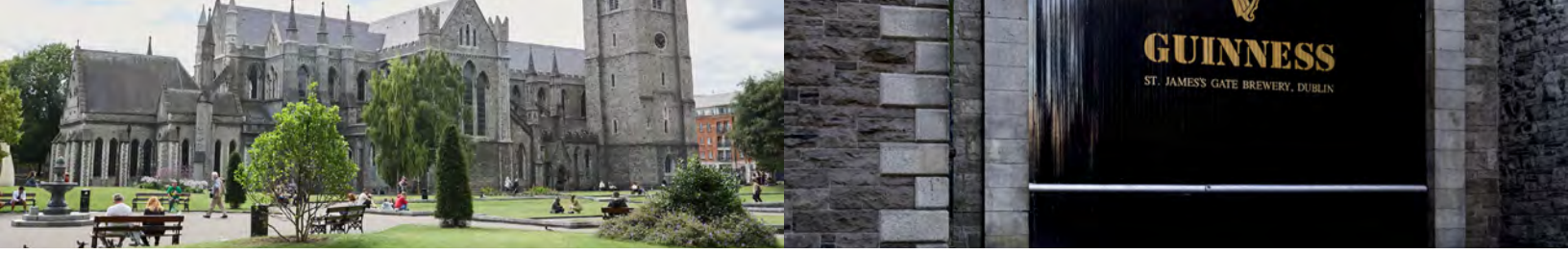

Ireland's capital blends rich history, lively culture, and warm hospitality, offering endless ways to immerse yourself in the country before you set out into the peaceful landscapes of Wicklow. With world-class museums, iconic landmarks, and a vibrant food and music scene, Dublin sets the tone for an unforgettable Irish journey.

### Things to See and Do in Ballycastle

#### Trinity College & the Book of Kells

Walk through Ireland's oldest university, famed for its cobbled courtyards and historic library. The 9th-century Book of Kells is one of the country's greatest artistic treasures.

#### Dublin Castle & Chester Beatty

Explore centuries of Irish history at Dublin Castle, then wander next door to the Chester Beatty Library—an award-winning museum housing rare manuscripts, artworks, and global artefacts.

#### Kilmainham Gaol

A powerful and moving museum offering insight into Ireland's struggle for independence, housed within a former 19th-century prison.

#### St Stephen's Green & Grafton Street

There are four primary international airports in Ireland: Dublin, Shannon, Cork, and Belfast (Aldergrove) International. Several smaller regional airports—Kerry, Knock, Donegal, and Belfast City (George Best)—also provide convenient access from mainland Europe and the UK.

For tours beginning in Dublin, Dublin Airport is by far the most convenient arrival point. It is Ireland's busiest and best-connected airport, served by hundreds of international flights daily.
